HAD REFUSED NOURISHMENT FOR 38 DAYS

Aged Watertown Shoemaker Insisted It Did Him No Good.

WATERTOWN, Dec. 12.—Further information regarding the death of aged Joseph Mitchell, the shoemaker, given to-day by his son, Dennis Mitchell of No. 29 Bridge street, revealed circumstances that are probably without a parallel in Northern New York. For thirty-eight days immediately preceding death Mr. Mitchell refused all food with a persistence that could not be overcome.

Some time ago Mr. Mitchell suffered a stroke and gradually became worse. There was a blood clot on the brain. Two or three physicians were tried, but without any perceptible change in the man's condition. The old man became obstinate about taking his medicine.

WHY WATERTOWN MEN ARE NOT CHRISTIANS

Evangelist Rees Gives Eight Reasons That He Has Found in the Garland City.

WATERTOWN, Dec. 12.—At the fourth of the Sunday mass meetings for men this afternoon in Washington Hall and largely attended, Milton S. Rees of Rochester, the evangelist, took occasion to tell his listeners a dozen or so reasons why the men of Watertown are not Christians.

In his opening remarks, telling his reasons why men of this city are not Christians, Dr. Rees said that business was perhaps one of the greatest. "Men," he said, "put their heads down and live into their business and overlooked the higher and better life."

Prominent Watertown Woman Passes Away With Pneumonia at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel—Remains Will Arrive Here This Morning.

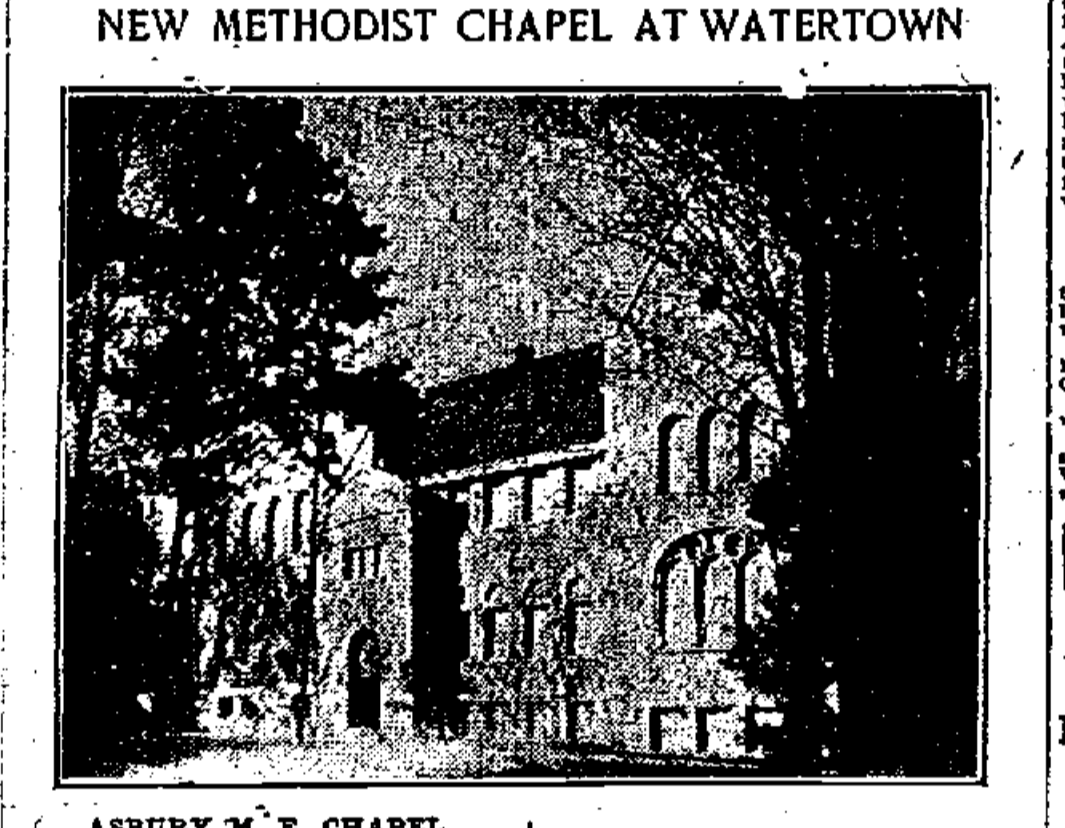

SHIPPERS SAY HIGH PRICES ARE JUSTIFIED

Gouverneur Dairymen Comment on Milk Investigation.

MARGIN OF PROFIT SMALL At Northern New York Stations the Actual Cost is Said to Be 6.1-2 Cents Per Quart Delivered on Cars.

SPECIAL TO THE POST-STANDARD. GOVERNEUR, Dec. 12.—The investigation of the so-called milk trust by the New York city authorities is causing considerable comment in Northern New York.

Actual figures were shown tending to prove that milk at the present time costs 6 1/2 cents per quart before it leaves Gouverneur. The present price paid for milk, both by the Borden plant and the St. Lawrence Farms, is 11 1/2 cents per hundred pounds, or about 6 1/2 cents per quart.

OLEOMARGARINE FINDS READY SALE IN VILLAGE STORES

GOVERNEUR, Dec. 11.—During the past two weeks large quantities of oleomargarine have been shipped to dealers in Gouverneur. It is being readily sold at 25 cents per pound. Butter is being sold at from 35 to 37 cents per pound.
