## Hughes to Direct 51st C of C Dinner

Douglas W. Hughes of Flushing, Republican candidate for borough president, has been named chairman for the 51st annual dinner of the Queens Chamber of Commerce on Dec. 3 at the Commodore Hotel, Manhattan.

Hughes, Long Island public relations manager of the New York Telephone Company, said awards will be presented for the best buildings erected from Sept. 22, 1962 to Sept. 21, 1963.

A CHAMBER director and chairman of its legislative committee, Hughes has served the Telephone Company

for 40 years, 20 as Queens Division manager. He is a trustee of the Queens County Savings Bank, a member of the Chase Manhattan Bank's Queens Advisory Board, and is on the board of directors of the Central Queens Chapter of American Red Cross.

He also belongs to the Queens County Grand Jurors Association, the Queens Council of St. John's University and the Queensborough Elks Lodge and is a past president of the Queensborough Rotary Club and a director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

# Young Is Saddled With That Horse

HOLLYWOOD — Many of his admirers think it's a shame for Alan Young to be wasting his comic talents playing straightman to "Mr. Ed" the talking horse in the CBS-TV series of the same name.

Alan himself is more philosophical about it. He doesn't believe the horse is out to bury him.

"Maybe I'm kidding myself," Alan says, "but I figure I can HUMPHELY always break away and do another show, but Ed might run into real trouble if he tried it, and I think he knows it."

"But isn't Ed getting the best lines?" I asked.

"He certainly gets his share," Alan admits. "Don't forget, though, that I've always got to be there to hear Ed's lines."

FOR THOSE who have spared themselves the sight of a grown man conversing with a horse, it should be explained that Mr. Ed only

talks to and is understood by Wilbur, who is Alan Young.

"Are there times when you feel pretty silly about the whole thing?" I probed further.

"Only when I sometimes catch myself talking about the idiot horse after I've left the studio. But I'm not as bad off as some of the viewers."

"You mean . . . ?"

"Exactly. They write fan letters to Ed. The ones I really worry about are those which are signed by other horses."

"What is the gist of such letters?"

HORSEBACK riding. I'm convinced that riding is bigger in this country than bowling," says Alan, incredulously.

"You ever try to answer any of this horse mail?"

"I used to do it, and sign Ed's name. He can talk, as you know, but never learned to write. Now, however, the mail is too much for me. A girl named Millie in our office does it now. Writes a nice horse-hand, too."

Occasionally someone at the network decides it's a great idea to wire TV col-

umnists around the country and tell them that Mr. Ed will be telephoning them the next day.

I AM inclined to share the feeling of those Alan Young admirers mentioned at the beginning here. It is a shame his talents are being frittered away on a series which too often is more ridiculous than whimsical.

From 1951 to 1953 Alan was also on CBS-TV with a fine half-hour weekly sketch comedy show. Recently I watched Danny Kaye do an airplane skit which was almost a duplicate of one Alan did then, and no funnier, if memory serves me right.

But the minute that TV ratings of comedy shows sagged a point or two in those earlier years, the network brass and sponsors suddenly decided that a comic just couldn't do comedy every week. Red Skelton was the only weekly comic who survived that period.

Now, however, CBS seems to be convinced that Kaye can do it, and without a family like the one Danny Thomas adopted, or a horse like the one Alan is currently saddled with.
